- "At the time (1970) there was none"
- "...Through media advertisements, eg. Mike Walsh Show, The Age..."
- "...this was only discovered by chance..."
- "None was available"
- "Very little information available 14 years ago"
- "We didn't get any information after many phone calls on our own initiative, discovered Star, Toy Library, etc"
- "We never had any information!!! We asked questions but no one could answer them"
- "I had very little information"
- "I think the information is available, but speaking as a parent, you don't know what to ask or who"
- "...when eventually found"
- "No useful information received early..."
- "There wasn't any until recently"
- "Doctor gave us nothing but his bill"
